



ACACIA STENOPHYLLA SHOESTRING ACACIA

This fast growing, tough evergreen tree grows to 40 to 50 feet tall with an open, wispy, picturesque habit. The unusual grey phyllodes are less than 1/4" wide but often over 18" long, appearing much like a shoestring. The showy creamy-yellow flowers are borne in small globular clusters along the stems from late winter through spring. Constricted bean-like pods are produced in profusion and can be a bit messy on patios and around pools. It tolerates heavy and wet soils, although it is very drought tolerant when established. Shoestring acacia is reported to be somewhat susceptible to Texas Root Rot and has a tendency to form weak "V" crotch branches. This Australian native looks great in groves.
