



BEBBIA JUNCEA SWEET BUSH

This native shrub isn't going to win any beauty contests, but it is important for revegetation projects and erosion control. Also, it attracts butterflies! Sweet bush, also called Chuckwalla's Delight, is a sparsely-foliated shrub (i.e.: scraggly) that grows to about 4 feet tall and wide. It is native to dry slopes, washes, and roadsides from the southwestern U.S. to northern Mexico, at elevations up to 4000 feet. Sweet bush blooms most of the year with ½" wide yellow flowers, which occur at the branch tips. These sweet-smelling flowers are not showy, but are a great source of nectar. Sweet bush is hardy to 15° F, and should be planted in full sun and well-drained soil.
