

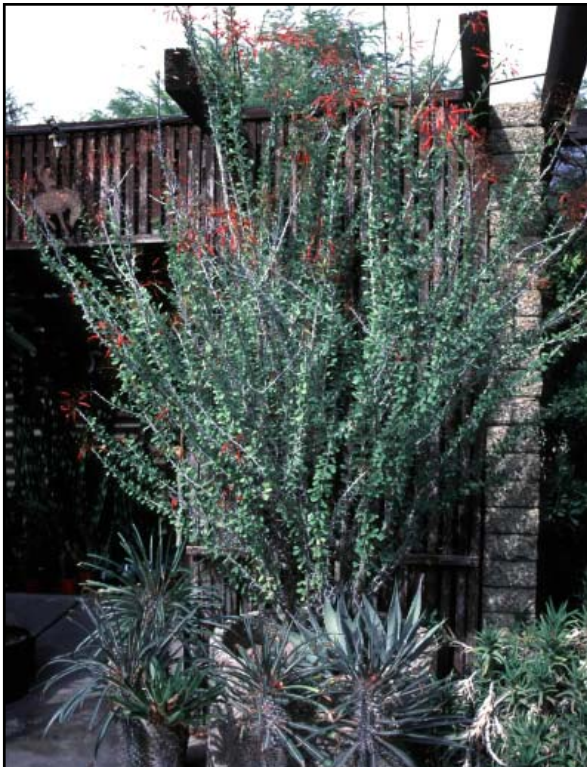


FOUQUIERIA MACDOUGALII MEXICAN TREE OCOTILLO

This large spiky shrub occurs on rocky slopes in Sonora, Mexico at elevations of 500 to 2500 feet. Long, spiny branches often referred to as “canes” arise from a short thick trunk. Mature plants can reach 24 feet in height, but typically they are found much smaller. The small green leaves that line the branches are drought-deciduous, but will remain on the plant with supplemental irrigation. Bright red flower clusters appear primarily in spring, but plants may bloom intermittently throughout the year attracting hummingbirds. Plant in well drained soils.
