



RHUS MICROPHYLLA LITTLELEAF SUMAC

Occurring across the Southwestern states at elevations from 2000 to 6000 feet, Littleleaf sumac is hardy to -10°F. This deciduous shrub forms a densely branched mound to 6 feet tall by 8 feet wide. The arching branches end in a spine, creating terrific cover and protection for birds and small mammals. Birds appreciate the small red berries produced in late summer. The compound leaves have 5 to 9 green leaflets, which turn orange-red in autumn. Littleleaf sumac is extremely drought and heat tolerant. USDA Zone 6.
