



SALIX TAXIFOLIA YEW-LEAF WILLOW

Common from Arizona into Texas along streambeds and seeps at elevations from 4000 to 5000 feet, this large shrub or small tree has a slower growth rate than other species of willow. Most specimens rarely exceed 6 feet in diameter. The leaves are gray-green and needle-like to two inches in length and somewhat resemble those of yew plants. As a result, it is often referred to as yew-leaf willow. Plant in full sun and provide moderate to ample irrigation.
