



VAUQUELINIA CALIFORNICA ARIZONA ROSEWOOD

This slow-growing, evergreen shrub or small tree is native to southern Arizona and Mexico, occurring at elevations of 2500 to 5000 feet. The dark green, leathery and lance-shaped leaves resemble those of oleander, except the margins are serrated. Flattened clusters of tiny white flowers appear in late spring, eventually developing into persistent tan colored fruit. Rosewood may be planted in full sun and should be provided well-drained soils. Unlike oleander it is not poisonous and produces beautiful multi-trunked specimens that may be 15 feet tall by 10 feet across.
